Building for Success: From Arrest to Reentry

The Ohio Justice Alliance for Community Corrections invites you to join us for the 24th annual OJACC Conference on September 30 – October 1, 2010 in Columbus, Ohio at the Crowne Plaza Doubletree. This year's conference will focus on "Building for Success: From Arrest to Reentry. We believe our slate of presenters will challenge us with new ideas that will live up to that theme. National and local practitioners will present models found through research to be most effective in changing offender behavior.

We are extremely pleased that four nationally known speakers will be presenting this year: Dr. H. Westley Clark, Director of the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment under the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration; Dr. Mark R. Munetz, Professor and The Margaret Clark Morgan Endowed Chair of Psychiatry at the Northeastern Ohio Universities Colleges of Medicine and Pharmacy (NEOUCOM) and Chief Clinical Officer of the Summit County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Board; Dr. Patricia Van Voorhis, Professor of Criminal Justice at the University of Cincinnati; and former ODCRC Director, Dr. Reginald A. Wilkinson, currently

the President & CEO of the Ohio College Access Network. Dr. Mark R. Munetz and Dr. Patricia Van Voorhis will join us for our Opening Plenary on Thursday morning. Dr. Munetz helped plan and implement the first Crisis Intervention Team training program in Ohio and was involved in the planning for the first Mental Health Court in the state. We will hear specifically about the use of the Sequential Intercept Model as an approach to decriminalization of people with mental illness. Dr. Van Voorhis has published extensively in the leading criminology and criminal justice journals and is the author of *Psychological Classification of the Adult, Male Prison Inmate*, and lead author of *Correctional Counseling and Rehabilitation*. She will present on women offenders, risk assessment and correctional classification.

Friday morning we are honored to have Dr. H. Westley Clark and Dr. Reginald A. Wilkinson will present the Closing Plenary. Dr. Clark's areas of expertise include substance abuse treatment, methadone maintenance, pain management, co-occurring disorders, psychopharmacology, anger management, and medical and legal issues. Dr. Wilkinson has authored numerous articles on a variety of correctional topics. He is editor of two books:

Correctional Best Practices: Directors' Perspectives and Best Reentry Practices: Directors' Perspectives.

This two-day conference will cover several practices proven by research to produce better outcomes and reduce criminal risk in the community corrections population. Participants will learn about treatment models for dual diagnosis, crisis intervention, reentry programming, motivational interviewing, and effective practices in community supervision, and substance abuse screening and referral to treatment.

Juvenile justice workshops will focus on current research on what constitutes best practices for juvenile reentry, juvenile competency, and media impact on youth.

For the fourth year, the ODCRC Clifford Skeen Awards will be presented in conjunction with the OJACC Achievement Awards luncheon. Plans are also underway for a golf outing on September 29, 2010.

Use of the Sequential Intercept Model as an Approach to Decriminalization of People with Serious Mental Illness

*Dr. Mark R. Munetz, M.D.,
Northeastern Ohio Universities

This general session will provide an overview of the Sequential Intercept Model, which provides a conceptual framework for communities to use when considering the interface between the criminal justice and mental health systems as they address concerns about criminalization of people with mental illness. The model envisions a series of points of interception at which an intervention can be made to prevent individuals from entering or penetrating deeper into the criminal justice system. Ideally, most people will be intercepted at early points, with decreasing numbers at each subsequent point. The interception points are law enforcement and emergency services; initial detention and initial hearings; jail, courts, forensic evaluations, and forensic commitments; reentry from jails, state prisons, and forensic hospitalization; and community corrections and community support. The model provides an organizing tool for a discussion of diversion and linkage alternatives

and for systematically addressing criminalization. Using the model, a community can develop targeted strategies that evolve over time to increase diversion of people with mental illness from the criminal justice system and to link them with community treatment.

Dr. Reginald Wilkinson, Ohio College Access Network



Dr. Reginald A. Wilkinson has been a champion of correctional training, accreditation, restorative justice, victims' rights and the development of new technologies while becoming a spokesman for corrections both in Ohio and around the world. A leading proponent of a balanced, progressive approach to corrections--both within the prison system and in the

community, Dr. Wilkinson will share lessons learned over the 30 years he has worked in various prison systems, in overcoming offender barriers to successful reentry.

Substance Abuse Treatment for Those Reentering Communities from the Judicial System

Dr. H. Westley Clark, Center for Substance Abuse Treatment under the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services



Dr. Clark's presentation will draw upon data from the National Survey of Drug Use and Health, Drug Abuse Warning Network, and the Treatment Episode Data Set to emphasize the relationship between substance abuse disorders and experience with the criminal justice system. Current SAMHSA priorities, initiatives, and programs will be discussed, with particular emphasis on programs that assist those re-entering their communities from the judicial system. Dr. Clark will also emphasize the importance of evidence-based programs and a holistic approach to treatment.

(1-A) Mental Illness and Developmental Disabilities in Ohio: Where We Are, Where We're Going

Lara Palay, Department of Developmental Disabilities

This workshop will focus on the needs of people with dual diagnoses of mental illness and developmental disabilities; current strategies and innovations across Ohio; and the role of the Mental Illness/Developmental Disability Coordinating Center of Excellence (MIDD CCOE)

(2-A) Crisis Intervention - De-Escalation (COB)

Lt. Scott Niehaus, Geauga County Sheriff's Office and Deanna Brant, Ravenwood Mental Health Center

This workshop will provide an overview of the CIT Program Model - its history, development, design, challenges and accomplishments - currently being utilized in Geauga County. Included will be the De-Escalation course of study being taught as the primary basis for crisis response specific to the law enforcement officer and those in related fields that encounter individuals in crisis in the Geauga County community. The ten basic principles of effective crisis intervention will be discussed and demonstrated. Participants will increase their awareness of cues to use in resolving crises, especially those involving the mentally ill and/or substance abusing person, and be exposed to the therapeutic and practical communication skills that increase the likelihood of a positive outcome - reduced use of force, improved safety outcomes for officers and civilians, and more appropriate outcomes for the individual in crisis. The training will also focus on the communication

and collaboration efforts between law enforcement and mental health providers that is critical to ensuring the success of a CIT Program.

(3-A) The Role of Family In Recidivism Reduction

Kimberly Hettel and Candace Knight, Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction

When ex-offenders reenter their families and communities after a period of incarceration they often face multiple barriers that threaten their ability to reintegrate. Families, without support, are often ill prepared to support their loved ones' reentry needs. This workshop will focus on the important role families hold in successful reintegration and will discuss Ohio's current Family Reentry Programs.

Workshops

(4-A) Capacity Building for Offender Based Housing

Ted Jones, Corporation for Supportive Housing and Robert Tankersley, Southern Ohio Rehabilitation Treatment Services

At this workshop attendees will learn of the Corporation for Supportive Housing's capacity building work which includes the CSH training Institutes, capacity building grants and technical assistance. Attendees will hear what it took for their organization, a half-way house provider, to become a CSH contracted reentry supportive housing provider.

(5-A) SBIRT (Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment) (COB)

Sheryl Gould and Kriss Haren, Kettering Medical Center

SBIRT (Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment) is a comprehensive, integrated, public health approach to the delivery of early intervention and treatment services for persons with substance use disorders, as well as those who are at risk of developing these disorders. This workshop will provide the attendees with the rationale for using SBIRT with their clientele, and a basic overview of motivational interviewing (MI), the process by which brief interventions are accomplished.

(6-A) CANEI: Constant and Never Ending Improvement – An Innovative Restorative Justice Program for Challenging Adolescents (COB)

Judy Strnard, National Youth Advocate Program, Inc.

CANEI is an innovative program for adolescents with histories of aggressive, defiant or violent behavior. Collectively, these young people pose a steep, escalating challenge to traditional models of care and represent a population for whom many have given up hope. CANEI proposes

that youth violence is a learned behavior, a rationally linkable reaction to victimization caused by physical, sexual, and emotional traumas or social disenfranchisement. CANEI is a strength-based program that seeks to help adolescents restore confidence and control in their lives, and create a brighter future for themselves. CANEI's holistic approach, focusing on the three pillars of CANEI, Restorative Justice, Literacy and Spirituality, is a cost effective alternative to group/residential care, incarceration and hospitalization. CANEI is committed to best treatment practices. Internal quality management staff and external evaluator compare outcomes for each model of implementation and component of care with the singular goal of continuous improvement in program design and outcome. Youth served in the CANEI program range in age from 12-20. CANEI is a nationally based program presently serving youth in California, Illinois, Ohio and Georgia through the National Youth Advocate Program, Inc.

(1-B) Three Minute MI: Practicing Motivational Interviewing in the Real World (COB)

Bobbie J. Herron-Boyer, Consultant

Motivational Interviewing has been identified as a best practice strategy for working with criminal justice populations. Like other evidenced based approaches, sometimes there is a wide disconnect between theory and practice. This workshop will focus on why MI works and how easily it can become an essential tool for practitioners in the "real world". The presenter will use a combination of presentations, interactive dialogue, and hands on activities to examine the spirit and value of motivational interviewing as a flexible strategy that can be used in a broad number of settings.

(2-B) Community Based Partners for Offender Success

Dr. Craig T. Follins, Cuyahoga Community College, Carmen DeHaan and Jimmy Tyree, U.S. Probation

The goal of the workshop is to highlight the importance of community partners in planning for an offender's re-entry, job readiness, and future success. Participants will learn necessary skills and techniques to use to form effective, reciprocal relationships with institutions of higher learning (colleges and universities) through (a) a case study; (b) utilizing a workforce specialist; and (c) forming the professional relationship with community partners. Attendees will leave with a better understanding of under-utilized, vital and affordable resources available to criminal justice clientele in and around their surrounding communities.

(3-B) Urban Youth Works

Lois Hochstetler, Alvis House and Edward Little, Cuyahoga County Department of Justice Affairs

Alvis House has operated a young adult reentry program with an emphasis on career development for more than four years. The program's target population includes offenders age 17-21 who are within 90 days of release from a Department of Youth Services (DYS) correctional facility or who are under supervision in the community. This presentation will provide an overview of the current program, as well as highlight successful program components and lessons learned from serving this unique and challenging population. In addition, the realities of providing services under multiple funding sources and in the changing juvenile justice system will be discussed. This workshop will also explore the most effective tactics to prevent juvenile delinquency and recidivism. It will also highlight innovative strategies that incorporate engaging the children and their families early on in the juvenile delinquency process and will also highlight strategies in combating DMC.

(4-B) Thinking for a Change: Program Concepts and Lesson Demonstration (COB)

Tracy Walenciej and Frank Marcino Jr, Eastern Ohio Correction Center and Coretta Pettway, Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction

This workshop will review the theoretical foundations of cognitive behavioral approaches and the core components of the “Thinking for a Change” (T4C) program and planning for the implementation of the T4C program within a prison or agency. Presentation will include a demonstration of a cognitive self-change lesson, a social skill lesson, and a problem solving lesson.

(5-B) SBIRT (Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment) (COB)

Sheryl Gould and Kriss Haren, Kettering Medical Center

This workshop will build on the overview of motivational interviewing from session one by providing attendees the opportunity to learn and practice basic MI techniques through small-group activities. These “real-play” exercises will be created from participant-suggested scenarios.

(6-B) When a Delinquent Juvenile Isn't Sent Away

Doug Althaus, Esquire, and Brenda K. Smith, Franklin County Juvenile Court

This workshop will discuss the issue of how more and more delinquent youth receive sanctions that keep them living in their homes and communities, rather than in ODYS facilities or county/regional detention centers. Additionally, new considerations around juvenile competency are weighing in on juvenile adjudications, with the result that some juvenile offenders are deemed inappropriate for any adjudication at all. With these innovations come new

responsibilities for court personnel and community agencies to address the needs of youth who are identified as prone to misbehavior. This workshop will address a pending proposal for juvenile competency standards and proposed responsibilities on court personnel and community agents, and will also provide an overview of an innovative model from Franklin County Juvenile Court to address the clinical and behavioral needs of youth who are adjudicated delinquent, but sentenced to something other than a residential lock up facility.

(1-C) ORAS (COB)

Edward Rhine, Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction and Lori Francescon, Franklin County Adult Probation Department

ORAS (the Ohio Risk Assessment System) is almost here! This panel will discuss the research behind ORAS and its various tools and their application at various stages of the criminal justice system. It will also highlight the benefits of ORAS, describe implementation planning efforts now underway, and look ahead to what the future holds for community corrections professionals and other stakeholders across Ohio.

(2-C) The In's and Out's of a Reentry Coalition

Angela Lee, Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction

Participants will be provided information and an overview related to the state and local Reentry Coalition building process, the importance/benefits/funding eligibility of having a local reentry coalition, and how the local coalition ties into the state and federal efforts.

(3-C) Implementation of Evidence Based Practices in CBCF's (COB)

Lori Brusman Lovins, University of Cincinnati

This workshop will focus on the implementation process designed to assist programs to make adjustments in programming consistent with evidence-based practices. This process helps programs to design treatment consistent with a cognitive behavioral model. Implementation involves selection of EB curricula and assessments, design and use of an effective behavior management system and developing criteria for selection and completion of participants. This workshop will refer specifically to the current implementation project with the Ohio Community Based Correctional Facilities as well as past experiences with program implementation.

(4-C) Effective Practices in Community Supervision (EPICS) (COB)

Myrinda Schweitzer, University of Cincinnati

This presentation will provide a new model developed by the University of Cincinnati: Effective Practices in Community Supervision. This will include an overview, description and purpose of the EPICS model: to teach probation and parole officers how to apply the principles of effective intervention and core correctional practices specifically to community supervision practices by increasing dosage to higher risk offenders, focusing on criminogenic needs (especially the thought-behavior link), and using a social learning, cognitive behavioral approach to their interactions. The workshop will provide the techniques and skills officers can use to increase their effectiveness.

(5-C) Cognitive Programming Targeted for the Nonsupport of Dependents Probationer (COB)

*Krista Conkey and Franceen Wilkins,
Franklin County Common Pleas Court*

The Nonsupport of Dependents probationer population has been identified as an important group to target for prison diversion. There is more to this population than child support payments. Often there are significant barriers with anti-social thinking; financial management; understanding familial responsibilities; and employment skills. This workshop will discuss the cognitive programming that the Franklin County Adult Probation has implemented to keep Nonsupport of Dependents probationers in the community and increase their motivation and ability to make pro-social changes.

(6-C) New Media and the Courts

Chris Davey, Supreme Court of Ohio

With camera phones in the courtroom, jurors tweeting, and judges on Facebook, the new media environment has major implications for the administration of justice. In partnership with the Scripps School of Journalism at Ohio University and the National Center for State Courts, the Conference of Court Public Information Officers conducted a survey of state judicial system court professionals across the country examining their experiences and perceptions of new media and the courts. This presentation will explain the results of the survey and look at specific ways that courts are using new media and how courts are responding to challenges raised by the technology.
